RQG Board Meeting June 26. 2022

The June 26, 2022, Zoom meeting of the Board of the Richmond Quilter's Guild was called to order by President Barbara Vonada at 2:01 p.m. Those present were Barbara Vonada, Elma Cooper, Sue Ann Bickert, Anna Williams, Sherry Whitford, Cathy Fibich, Karen Steele, Anne Wright, Donna Booth, Jennifer Johnson, and Ann Shibut.

The minutes of the June 5,2022, RQG officer's meeting were read and a motion to approve them as read was made, seconded and passed.

President Barbara Vonada reported that visits to the chapters are underway, that she has prepared membership cards and will be getting them to the various chapters, that she had received ten free tickets to the October Quilt Expo and will distribute two each per chapter for raffling, and that she attended the Amelia Lavender Festival and sold \$400 worth of raffle tickets there. (The winner will be chosen at our May 2023 Quilt show).

Secretary, Ann Shibut, is tendering her resignation as Guild Secretary as she is moving from Richmond. She will continue to edit the Guild newsletter utilizing the internet.

The Treasurer, Anne Wright, reported a balance of \$10,985.29 in the RQG account, and a balance of \$11,512.97 in the Quilt Show account. She received a check in the amount of \$54 representing the money due back to the Guild upon the chapter's dissolution. She further stated that Guild membership now stands at 239.

Program chair, Elma Cooper, presented a draft proposal for the agenda of the Fall Meeting to be held on October 1, 2022, at Shady Grove Methodist Church. The day's plans include a Hoffman Challenge presentation, several class offerings, a fashion show of quilts, a Jelly Roll Race and Back to Basics. Scissors sharpening will be offered, as well as a space to "sit and sew" for those not taking classes. We will also celebrate the Guild's 44th birthday.

The President had sent copies of the revised Guild brochure and requested any necessary changes or corrections before they are printed.

Individual chapter reports were given with planned yard sale, charity quilt-a-thons, growth in membership among the details mentioned.

As a means to educate newer members and inspire additional members there are plans to create a Back to Basics curriculum which will be given to each chapter for use as they choose. Experienced teacher, Dianne Portwood and Bradleigh Barthel will be asked to chair this initiative and develop the program.

The President asked that each chapter send her an inclusive list of quilting and quilt-related events for the upcoming months which she will use to create a rolling calendar to be printed in each issue of *Threads of Thought*. These need not necessarily be guild-connected, but of interest to the guild or events that could better connect us to our community.

On July 16 there will be a Quilter's Yard Sale of the quilt items donated by surviving charter member, Ruth Ann Puckett, hosted by Bits & Pieces chapter at the Varina Ruritan site. Sherry Whitford moved that \$100 from the proceeds of this sale go to Bits & Pieces to defray their hosting expenses and a thank you for their help. Jennifer Johnson seconded the motion and it was passed.

Barbara discussed the advisability of updating/refreshing our website and she will work in conjunction with our Web Master, Marina Hernandez to accomplish this. Barbara is forming a new Quilters' Care committee to be a "quick reaction" team when help is requested by people who need guidance and/or help in disposing of a family member's quilting supplies for whatever reason (death, moving, etc.). Sherry Whitford agreed to be the committee/team lead. Barbara would like each chapter to send her an inclusive list of the charities that they have currently and previously supported. She would also like a list of those Guild Members, or former members, who are now housebound and unable to attend meetings or continue sewing because of infirmities.

In view of the next significant birthday of the Guild, Barbara asked the Board to be thinking of the desirability of changing or updating the Guild logo. Does the current logo identify us to strangers as a Richmond group of quilters?

The next newsletter deadline is July 11.

Barbara asked everyone to mark their calendars with dates of future Board meetings as follows:

2022- August 28, October 23, and December 18. **2023** February 26, April 23, June 25, August 27, October 22, December 17. **2024** February 25, April 28, June 23. She remarked that all of these meetings may not occur, she would rather cancel a date than try to find another one when needed.

There's a lot going on at the Virginia Quilt Museum throughout the summer. New exhibits and several programs which require advance registration.

And on August 13 Suzi Parron, author of "Barn Quilts and the American Quilt Trail Movement" will give an illustrated presentation of her investigation of this phenomenon.

Our Guild History

A few months ago then Guild VP Elma Cooper suggested that a brief history of the Richmond guild be included on our website, and I recently sent one to the webmaster. To write ir I referred to the Guild history articles which I included in *Threads of Thought* back in 2019. We have gained many new members in the three years since then and I decided to run them again, updating the information as needed. I gave the incorrect date for original publication of these history articles. They began in March 2003.

The Evolution of Chapters. (Updated & edited version first printed in TOT 3/ 2003)Almost from the very beginning it became obvious to the newly organized Richmond Quilter's Guild that they should split into smaller groups to meet the needs for different meeting times. Women working outside the home obviously could not attend weekday meetings and wanted to continue the Saturday afternoon meetings, while others preferred a weeknight evening time. Geography also played a part in the division, with the original group, named Friendship Circle, meeting on the north side of the river and a newer evening group [1980] meeting south of the James. They called themselves James River Heritage Quilters.

The Guild as a whole ordinarily met only twice a year: at a "Fall Seminar" using the format of the meetings which had so successfully provided momentum for the creation of the Guild, and at an Annual Meeting in the spring where the business of electing new Guild officers could take place. For a few years there also was a special "Summer workshop" offered when a particular teacher was available to teach. I especially remember one year when we had a teacher guiding us through Hawaiian quilting. The leaders of the Guild stressed the importance of the two Guild-wide meetings, so everyone and feel a part of the whole. The five Guild officers's main duties were to plan for and organize those two meetings, to prepare a Guild membership list, and to issue periodic newsletters to keep all the members informed. Guild Board meetings were relatively few. Details of how chapters would organize and run themselves were left pretty much to them, though early on it was decided that members' dues would mostly remain in the chapter treasury to cover the cost of their programs, etc., with a portion sent to the Guild primarily to pay for the newsletter. In 1987 the Board recommended and the Guild voted to become incorporated, and the constitution and by-laws were adjusted to gain approval of the State Corporation Commission.

As needs changed, more chapters were added. By 1982 "members of the Guild wanted a weekday chapter — added to for those not able to attend a night or weekend chapter." Hospitality Chapter organized on April 7, 1982, with 15 dues-paying members. A previously organized group of quilters in Colonial Heights decided to seek affiliation with the RQG. Colonial Quilters with 28 members becam the fourth chapter of the Guild in September 1982. In May 1996, Colonial Quilters voted to withdraw from the Guild partly because it had become increasingly onerous for their officers to drive to attend Guild Board meetings and their members to come to participate in Guild events.

20 women formed Piecemakers Chapter in August, 1985 meeting the needs of many Mechanicsville area quilters. And growth continued with the addition of Bits and Pieces chapter in June, 1989. This east end group planned to meet in the evenings. They were followed closely by Country School Quilters who were formally added to the Guild in September 1989. Their members were drawn from western Hanover County and also chose to have evening meetings.

Following the departure of Colonial Quilters the number of chapters remained at six until Crazy Quilters organized and joined the Guild in April 2002. This active group consisted of 33 enthusiastic ladies from the Mechanicsville area. The number of chapters continued at a total of 7 until April 2013 when Country School chapter voted to end its affiliation with the Guild. Then in March 2015 Friendship Circle also left us. (Following the rules for dissolution which required them to dispose of the chapter property the members voted to give me their President's Friendship Circle quilt made by the members, including me, in 1982. Gratefully receiving it, it is on my guest-room bed).

The chapter total remained at 5 until the summer/fall of 2019 when quilters in the west end formed WEQuilt. Unfortunately, the arrival of the awful Covid pandemic in early 2020 played a large part in the early demise of the group. How could any new organization survive this disruptive and isolating disease? They struggled valiantly to continue until March 2022, leaving the Guild but hoping to continue as an independent quilting group.

Thus, in the summer of 2022 we find ourselves again with 5 stalwart chapters. Stay tuned to see what the future brings.
